



ANTIGUA CASA DE GUARDIA

This famous tavern was founded by the famous Malaga distiller and winemaker José de Guardia in 1840. It's the oldest wine cellar in the city and a true monument to Malaga's wines and history. Here you can try sweet wines such as Pajarete, Pedro Ximénez, Moscatel or Guinda, accompanied by mussels, prawns or langoustines.



Located in the heart of Malaga, its name comes from the famous cafe-theatre "El Chinitas" which was opened in the 19th century. This unique establishment, decorated with paintings of toreadors, bases its cuisine on local produce and the Mediterranean diet, as well as typical dishes from Malaga and a wide variety of tapas.





EL PIMPI

A city icon, and a meeting place for Malaga's residents and tourists, El Pimpi opened its doors in 1971. Located in an 18th century Malaga mansion, here you can enjoy local cuisine and wines. Generations of personalities from the world of flamenco, politics and art have passed through its rooms.
